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## MAYOR & CITY COUNCIL CORNER Highland City Library and the Highland Youth City Council

This year the **Highland City Library** board is promoting the library as the Heart of the Community. It is one of the few meeting places in Highland and we want people to feel welcome and comfortable in the library. I know you are aware of the importance of reading to your young children so you may already be aware of Story Time at the library and how it is such a well done program but are you aware of the following services?:

- Interlibrary loan--up to three per month per library card
- Online booklists--<http://highlandcity.org/index.aspx?mid=125>
- Book Club resources--interested book clubs can order multiple copies of a book for their club. Lists of available books are available online at <http://highlandcity.org/index.aspx?NID=359> as are suggestions on how to run a book club and reading guides
- Mango Languages are available online to study many different languages including English as a second language. You have to be a library card holder to gain access.
- Books and audiobooks are available for download to your e-reader, iPod, etc. from Overdrive and OneClickDigital--again, a library card is required to check these books out electronically
- DMV practice tests are available
- Literacy kits are available to check out--these include books, activities and games and other resources for helping your children learn. There are a variety of topics, not just reading.

There are additional programs as well. Frankly, there are so many things the library does, I cannot mention them all and I would encourage you to do 2 things. Visit the library and come to the work session the library board the city council will have this month. One issue we will be discussing is how to fund the library going forward. We have some choices on this topic and your input is important. Should we leave the dedicated property tax, should we fund the library with user fees, should we fund the library through the general fund from property and sales taxes? We could choose some combination of all 3.

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## Winter Snow Removal & Plowing

During the winter months it is important for Highland residents and the City to work together during snow removal weather. During heavy snow storms it can take as much as 48 hours to clear all priority routes and through streets once the storm has subsided. Parking on the street and objects in the road (trailers, basketball standards, etc.) makes it difficult for plows to clear the streets. Vehicles may not park on City Streets between 12:00 a.m. - 8:00 a.m., December 1st through March 31st, and anytime snow is present. The Police Department may issue a parking citation.

Many people use 4 wheelers to plow their drive ways and sidewalks; the Police Department reminds you that 4 wheelers are not allowed on the street unless they are street legal. **Co-ed Teen Soccer:** Come join the Cedar Hills Co-ed Teen Soccer League for high school students, grades 10 -12. Form your own teams and enter your team name when you register. There will be eight players on the field with four girls and four boys. Register online until March 15. Games will begin in April and will be played on Monday afternoons in Cedar Hills and American Fork.

**Tot Soccer** Is Back with the Spring Session! Cedar Hills Tot Soccer is a fun, six-week soccer league for children ages three and four. Games are played on Tuesday evenings, starting April 21. Parents are encouraged to coach, if possible. Online registration begins March 1 - April 9. The registration fee is \$25 plus a one-time fee of \$5 for a reversible T-shirt, which can be worn for any Cedar Hills youth sport program.

**Karate Classes:** A new session of karate classes begins January 12.

The one-hour classes are held Monday and Wednesday evenings for children ages 6-12 at the Cedar Hills Recreation Center. The beginner-level class (white belt only) is at 4:00, the level two class (yellow to senior orange belt) is at 5:00, and the level three class (blue to senior blue belt) is at 6:00. 1. Be a US Citizen at the time of filing
2. Be a registered voter of the municipality
3. Be a resident of the municipality for a period of 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the date of the election. (UCA 10-3-301; 20A-9-201; 20A-9-203)

- Candidate filing period begins: June 1, 2015
- Candidate filing deadline ends: June 8, 2015 (20A-9-203)

Declaration of Candidacy Forms or Nomination Petitions must be filed in person with the City Recorder at 5400 West Civic Center Dr. Highland, Utah between the hours of 8:00 am and 6:00 pm Monday-Thursday and 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm on Friday.
