Buhler Farm Celebrates 100 Years

The Buhler farm has been working the land on the corner of 6000 West and 10400 North in Highland for 100 years. Alma Buhler purchased the land to farm and raise a family in 1915. While he was there, he made a lot of friends in Highland. Lyman Buhler, Alma's son, took over the farm and continued to have strong ties to the community. Now Lyman's wife, Carol and her sons, run the family farm.

The Buhler's will be celebrating the farms 100 year anniversary during the annual Highland Fling Days on August 1st by participating in the parade. They have invited the Utah Antique Machinery Club to be in the parade. They invite all those who have a farm tractor to be in the parade with them to celebrate the agriculture roots that Highland was founded upon.

Arbor Day Annual Tree Sale

The annual Tree Sale will be held on April 25, from 8:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. on the corner of 10700 North and 5400 West by the Police Station, City Hall, and Library. April 25th is for Highland Residents only. You will need to bring proof of residency with you (ID, Utility Bill, etc.). We will only accept checks and cash. All trees are sold AS IS, with a maximum of 8 trees per resident. A list of trees for sale and their prices will be provided on-line at least one week before the Tree Sale on the Arbor Day page at www.highlandcity.org.

Some trees will be slightly higher in price due to limited quantities and a high demand from our grower. Maple trees quantities will be limited as the price is significantly higher this year. Any trees left over from the April 25th sale will be available to purchase on May 2nd.

Recreation Programs

Highland City participates with [Cedar Hills City Recreation](#). All youth sports and recreation programs are available with no additional non-resident fees. Please contact Cedar Hills Recreation at recreation@cedarhills.org or call: 801-785-9668, ext. 302.

Tot Soccer- Cedar Hills Tot Soccer is a fun, six-week soccer league for children ages three and four. Games are played on Tuesday evenings, starting April 21. Parents are encouraged to coach, if possible. Online registration begins March 1 at: cedarhills.org/recreation and continues through April 9. The registration fee is \$25 plus a one-time fee of \$5 for a reversible T-shirt, which can be worn for any Cedar Hills youth sport program.

T-Ball for Boys and Girls Ages 4 & 5: Cedar Hills offers T-Ball for boys and girls, ages four and five. Each child bats every inning and plays in the outfield. Curbside Recycling Tips - Earth Day!

Did you know that the earth has its very own holiday! Earth Day is April 22nd and was established in order to raise awareness about our responsibility to care for our planet. Check out these awesome facts about recycling and encourage your family and friends to participate in our local recycling program in honor of Earth Day! Call the city today to sign up!

Did you know... On average only 30% of our waste is recycled even though 70% of what we throw out is recyclable. Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to listen to a full album

on your iPod. Recycling 100 cans could light your bedroom for two whole weeks. The average household throws away 13,000 separate pieces of paper each year. Most is packaging and junk mail.

Burn Permits Available On-line

Burn Permits are not be available at City Hall or at the Lone Peak Fire Department. Burn permits may be issued on-line (<http://www.airquality.utah.gov/Compliance/OpenBurning/index.htm>) between March 30 and May 30 and between September 15 and October 30. Be sure to plan ahead - the entire permitting process could take 3-5 days to complete. Please include your email address when submitting a permit so you can receive your permit promptly. If completing the open burn permit application online is not an option, a hard copy of the open burn permit application, contact the DAQ by phone at (801) 536-4000. Please note: it may take up to 14 days from the date of request to receive an open burn permit if a hard copy is submitted for processing. You may also use the public computers at City Hall and the Library to request a permit.

DUP Pioneer Cabin at Heritage Park

The CUP Cabin in Heritage Park is hosting a celebration of the completion of the repairs to its exterior on Saturday, June 6, 2015 from 11:00-2:00 p.m. There will be a ribbon cutting ceremony at 11:00 a.m. This cabin is the oldest known home still standing in Highland. It was donated to the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers by the Stice family and moved to Heritage Park in May 1991.

The Utah State Legislature, through the Utah Division of Arts & Museums and the National Endowment for the Arts, provided the seed money of \$1,000. The community donated another \$3,202 in cash and materials and more than 770 hours of labor were donated. Please come and tour the repaired cabin.

The cabin will be open every Saturday in June and July from 12:00-2:00 p.m. It will be open from 9:00-3:00 p.m. during the Highland Fling.

Pressurized Irrigation

The pressurized irrigation system will be back on and ready for use the week of **April 15th**. Please be patient while the City brings up the system. It usually takes a week to ten days to bring online. Make sure your stop and waste valves are **shut off** while the system is being loaded. Individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

Spring Clean-Up

The annual Highland City Spring Clean-Up will take place May 1-2nd, 8:00 a.m.- 5:00 p.m. at the parking lot at the mouth of the American Fork Canyon. Dumpsters will be available so you can dispose of your metal, wood, household waste, and yard waste (please no hazardous materials). Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day

Utah County residents with household hazardous waste items such as old gasoline, paint, fluorescent light bulbs, and unused medications will be offered to dispose of these items safely on Saturday, April 11th from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The collection will take place in the west parking lot of the Provo Towne Centre Mall. Temporary Sign Permits

Temporary signs are intended to be displayed for a short period of time only. They are used to advertise temporary uses, special events, grand openings, seasonal sales, and promotions. Real estate signs, political signs, personal ideology signs, and garage sale signs also fall within this category.

Temporary Signs are currently regulated by Section 3-712 of the Development Code. These regulations limit temporary signs to grand opening signs, promotional signs, agricultural signs, model home signs, garage sale signs, and political signs. The placement of temporary signs is also prohibited anywhere within the public right-of-way; on or over any sidewalk, street, alley, or public place; and on private property within required sight distance triangles. In addition, with the exception of A-frame signs temporary signs are only allowed on the building. A permit through the city is required for all temporary signs.
