City Council Brief

September 6

City Council approved the purchase of a fence to go around the Town Center Splash Pad. The fence will be partially funded by a Utah County Recreation grant. The fence should assist in keeping children from running into the street and keeping animals from going inside.

The Preliminary Plat for Skye Ridge Estates was approved. Sky Ridge Estates is a 28 lot development at 11580 North 6000 West. The developer will now work with staff on their Final Plat application and Civil Plans before coming back to City Council at a future date.

September 20

Concerns have been raised regarding activity taking place in the parking lot for Highland Hollow park. City Council asked staff to explore options to deter any negative behavior from taking place.

The Final Plat was approved for Gable Ridge and Dry Creek Highlands Phase 8. Gable Ridge has 9 lots and will be located at 11580 North 6000 West. Dry Creek Highlands Phase 8 has 10 lots and will be at 6700 West 11900 North. The developers will now work with the City to get their civil plans approved before starting the building process

American Fork River Contamination

A dam-rehabilitation project in Tibble Fork Reservoir triggered an unexpectedly large release of sediment into the North Fork of the American Fork River on Saturday, August 20. A portion of Highland City's Pressurized Irrigation (PI) water comes from the American Fork River. The water that feeds Highland Glen pond comes solely from the American Fork river.

After the sediment release, the Utah Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) conducted tests on samples and found high levels of metal in American Fork River's sediment, but lower concentrations in the water itself. The Utah Department of Agriculture and Food does not believe the water poses a risk to livestock or crop irrigation. Since that time, the DEQ has continued testing the water. As of September 12, they found that turbidity and total suspended solids (TSS) show the river downstream from Tibble Fork Dam recovering to the point that dam operators are no longer in violation of turbidity and TSS standards.

To be cautious, Highland City tested the water in the Highland Glen Pond. All metals tested came back as non-detectable and under the MRL (Minimum Reporting Limit) except for arsenic. While the arsenic levels were above the MRL, they were well below the drinking water standards of 0.100.

Please remember that PI water is not treated and unsafe for direct human consumption. However there is no reason to believe it is not still safe for its intended uses for irrigation, livestock, and recreation. For more information on the Utah DEQ's findings, visit tibble.utah.gov. Highland City Cemetery Cleanup

Highland City seeks to offer families and friends that visit their loved ones resting in the cemetery a clean, beautiful, and peaceful environment. Please help us maintain this goal by keeping your site clean. The next cemetery decoration cleanup will be on Monday, October 3. Perishable items will be discarded and all trinkets, shepherd-crooks, etc. will be removed and taken to the Public Works Shop. These items will be held for two weeks to be claimed before they are discarded.

PI Shut Off for the Season

Beginning on October 15, Highland City Public Works will begin the process of draining and winterizing the pressurized irrigation (PI) system. While you may see water in the system shortly after the 15, water pressure will diminish rapidly as the ponds are drawn down. This is a good time to winterize your system as well. Irrigation systems should be completely drained to prevent damage caused by frozen water left in pipes, sprinklers, filters, and valves. An often overlooked step in the winterizing process is closing the main valve. This valve would be located in a box installed as part of your sprinkling system and is often in close proximity to the City's PI box. By closing this valve, flooding in the spring may be avoided should pipes freeze and break during the winter. Having the main valve closed will also help to protect your system from pressure fluctuations experienced when the system is charged in April. The Lone Peak Fire Department has opened burns permits for October 1—30. The open burn policy was changed in 2013 to meet the revised standards of the State Department of Air Quality (DAQ). Burn Permits are not be available at City Hall or at the Lone Peak Fire Department. Instead permits will be available free on-line at the DAQ's website: http://



Highland Historical Society

My Grandfather by Charles T Greenland

Charles T Greenland was born in Cwm Celyn (a suburb of Blaenavon), Monmouthshire, Wales April 13, 1864, the sixth child of Henry Eates and Hester Ann Tapper Greenland. His father worked at various jobs, including agricultural laborer, ostler (one who takes care of animals down in the mines), brickyard worker, iron worker, and coal miner. They moved around a lot, which is evidenced by the fact that each of their children were born in a different place.

Charles began school at the age of three and went to work in the coal mines at the age of eight. His father would carry him on his back to work. A law was passed making it illegal to work in the mines until you were twelve, so he went back to school until he turned twelve.

The Greenland's were baptized into the LDS Church in the early 1860's and Henry came to Utah in 1881. He worked diligently and sent for Charles and one sister in early 1882 and the remainder of the family came in late 1882 and they settled in Winter Quarters, Utah where they worked in the coal mines.

On of the pastimes of Charles and his friends was to go to the train depot when the trains came in so they could see the new emigrants. One time they were there when the Potter family arrived and when he saw their daughter, Rachel, he told his friends "she is the one for me". They were married within a year or so. 
