MAYOR'S CORNER

I look forward to another great year for Highland City in 2011. The City is progressing forward and is moving in the right direction on many issues. We began 2010 without a City Administrator and many City employees uncertain about the City's direction. Over this past year we hired John Park as our City Administrator and Nathan Crane as our new Community Development Director. John and Nathan bring expertise and solid management to the City and have solved several problems and developed solutions to insure the City is progressing. They have been a compliment to our excellent existing City staff.

The growth of our cash flow has been a major accomplishment of the City this past year. In October 2009 the City projected a negative cash flow for November 2010. Through decreased expenses and slowing of spending we ended November 2010 with \$1,123,242 total combined cash. This compares to November 2009 total combined cash of \$627,138. We need to continue to increase the cash of the city to meet future capital and residents needs of the City. Just two years ago we had a total combined cash balance of \$2,300,000, and five years ago we had a total combined cash balance of 6,800,000. We are working to return to a financially sound cash position.

Two other positive changes were accomplished by the City Council this year. The Town Center Ordinance was changed to reduce the density allowed in the Town Center. This will hopefully foster more commercial and less residential growth in the Town Center. The Murdock Canal Trail was approved to be completed following the piping of the

Murdock Canal over the next year. This trail will connect trails in Highland to allow residents to use the City trails more effectively.

At the beginning of the year the City Council was faced with a legal challenge with the Group Home Ordinance. The City Council began immediately and made changes to the Ordinance to better serve the City's interests as well as solving the legal issue before the City.

Construction on SR92 and North County Boulevard (4800 W) has had the City torn up all summer long. Several people have asked when they will be completed. North County Boulevard is projected to be completed to the Murdock Canal by May of 2011. Then the County plans to complete the rest of the Boulevard to State Street beginning next Summer. We are working with the County to hopefully do the East West Murdock Connector at the same time as North County Boulevard is constructed to State Street. SR 92 will continue with most of the work from Bull River to the Freeway and completion in 2012. Once complete these roads will help Highland residents travel more efficiently.

We thank you for your support. We are facing new challenges in 2011 and will keep you informed as they occur throughout the year. If you have any questions you can email me at mayor@highlandcity.org.
