MAYOR'S CORNER

The City Council has been discussing our Pressurized Irrigation (PI) rates over this past year. A major goal is to make sure all our enterprise funds are self sustaining. PI revenues have been behind expenses in the City for several years. When the City received a grant for PI in the late 90's rates were reduced \$10 per household per month. As expenses exceeded revenues, rather than raise rates the City did two things to help the situation. First, the City sold gravel where the old City water tanks were located for a one-time revenue of \$1,000,000. Second, the City refinanced the PI bond at a lower interest rate freeing up a one-time payment, but extending the bond for 5 years. Both of these helped to not raise rates, but did not address the problem of decreasing fund reserves because revenues did not match expenses.

Additionally, The City purchased water shares that became available from the Murdock Canal piping project. By purchasing the shares, water available in Highland stays in Highland instead of being sold to another entity. We as a City Council believed it was important to keep the water local to service our growth needs and ensure water for all residents. This purchase increased our expenses over the next 25 years.

We are now faced with a fund balance near zero and will go negative. If we have a major operational expense or capital expense repair, we would need to transfer funding from an

other source. Additional revenues are just not available. We have reduced expenses over this last year to the lowest we can and not affect service. The City Council voted last year to not raise rates until July 2011 and has done so. We will need to raise rates in July to keep the fund balance from going negative by a projected (\$297,000) in July 2012 the following year.

We must reduce this negative trend that has been occurring for the last several years. It is not financially sound management to allow a negative to continue. The question before the Council is how much to raise the rates? Do we just stop the negative at this time or do we build more reserves for emergencies and future needs. We need your help as we proceed with decisions. We will be holding open house presentations and council discussions on the specific details during our current budget review for next year's budget over the next three months. Please plan to attend and help us decide the best course. You can also comment on our new website or directly by email. We enjoy your comments and involvement in the City as we address problems and deliver services to residents.

PRESSURIZED IRRIGATION

The pressurized irrigation system will be back on and ready for use the week of **April 15**.

Please be patient while the City brings up the system. It usually takes a week to ten days to bring online. Make sure your stop and waste valves are **shut off** while the system is being loaded. Individual sprinkling systems can then be loaded by residents.

BURN PERMITS

This year the Utah County Fire Marshal has set the date for the burn window from April 1st to April 30th. Any resident inside the county is allowed to burn if they have a burn permit. You can obtain a burn permit at City Hall (M-Th, 7:30 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.) for no charge. With your permit you will also receive a list of rules that must be followed. Each day before you burn you must also call the burn hotline at 801-374-BURN to find out if the air quality is good enough to burn. The Lone Peak Fire District appreciates and supports your efforts to burn safely and comply with the Utah County burn permit rules.

All trees are sold AS IS, with a maximum of 8 trees per resident. We will not hold trees or take special orders. Triumph Blvd., Morning Glory Road Schedule to Re-Open at the End of the Month

Paving and commuter lane connections will be the focus of work along the Timpanogos Highway (S.R. 92) reconstruction corridor during the month of April.

“We have made good progress on the project during the winter,” said Utah Department of Transportation program director Bryan Adams, “but we have been looking forward to warmer spring temperatures, which will allow us to do more work more quickly.”

Warm weather means that paving operations can resume all along the corridor. Those who live and travel along Timpanogos Highway will also see work being done on a number of retaining walls, tunnels and roadway connections. Highland Blvd..

The end of the month will also bring the end of the ongoing closure of Triumph Blvd. and Morning Glory Road in the Traverse Mountain area.

“We appreciate the patience of all those who have been inconvenienced by closures and other construction activities,” Adams said. “We are pleased that we can begin to reward their patience with reopened access points and new, improved roadways.

The Timpanogos Highway project is expanding a section of S.R. 92 from I-15 to S.R. 74 in Highland, to five lanes. Between I-15 and Highland Boulevard, UDOT is augmenting the arterial with “Commuter Lanes,” which will provide a direct connection to and from I-15 without stopping at intersections. The project is scheduled for completion in October 2011.

How To Pack Your Wastes: Do not mix wastes. If possible, leave materials in original containers with labels intact, or mark containers if labels are missing. Be sure all containers are capped or sealed. Containers must be deposited with waste materials, they cannot be returned. Transport in a cardboard box lined with newspaper.
