MAYOR'S CORNER

Did you know that Highland City owns a park called Highland Glen Park? Do you know the park's location? In March a field trip was held to tour the park and see the beauty and treasure we have in our city. Some of the attendees commented that they were fairly new to Highland and did not know the park even existed. I believe that is true for many residents.

Highland Glen Park is located west of Lone Peak High School. You can enter the park from two locations, Knight Ave. off of 4800 West from the east side of town and West Park road off of SR 74 on the west side. The park has a beautiful pond with ducks and a trail system around the pond. The Division of Wildlife Resources stocks the pond with fish and fishing is enjoyed by many residents and non-residents. The park was originally called Adventure Learning Park when it was owned by the American Fork Developmental Center. It was used as a recreational and learning park for the center until Highland City purchased the park. Each year citizens of Highland participate in service projects to help maintain and beautify the park.

Unfortunately, over the years, budgets, funds and manpower has had to be cut and the ability to properly maintain the park has diminished and some of it has fallen into disrepair.

The docks are deteriorating, trails are cracked or broken, benches have been broken, and over growth of vegetation has blighted much of the area. As a city, a few months ago, we created a Parks Committee with three sub-committees; 1) Highland Glen Park, 2) Trails and 3) Other Parks. The three sub-committees are working hard on solutions and are doing a great job. We look forward to their recommendations so we can implement improvements in the city parks and trails. Some solutions can be done immediately; others will take a little time. We have some excellent parks and trails in Highland that all need work. Highland Glen Park is 75 acres and requires added emphasis and work. We would like to have volunteers help with much of the service labor needs so please help when the projects are identified.

This spring and summer take a walk or ride through Highland Glen Park. Take the kids for a picnic, fishing or just enjoy the park. It is truly a treasure in Highland and one that few cities have and can enjoy.

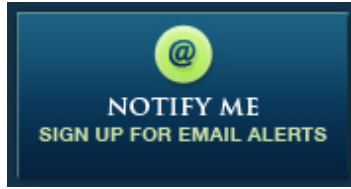

Cedar Hills Fire Station Staffed Full Time

As of April 1st 2011 the Lone Peak Fire District which covers Alpine, Highland and Cedars Hills will now have full time staffing at the Cedar Hills station. There will be 2 full time firefighters / emergency medical staff at the station 24/7 with an ambulance, fire engine and rescue equipment. The department also responds to emergencies up American Fork canyon.

Cedar Hills has been waiting a long time for this, the residents will now receive quicker emergency response. The station is located at 3925 West Cedar Hills Drive.

Work to Ramp Up on New DDI Ramps in May
Timpanogos Highway Interchange Will Get Its Own Diverging Diamond

Ramp work will “ramp up” in May for the Utah Department of Transportation’s new diverging diamond interchange (DDI), scheduled to built this summer at the Timpanogos Highway interchange with I-15 (often referred to as the Highland-Alpine interchange).

The reconfigured interchange was not originally part of the Timpanogos Highway reconstruction project, as it was anticipated that I-15 reconstruction would include this interchange. When the I-15 plan was altered, the state Transportation Commission approved an increase in the Timpanogos Highway budget to accommodate reconfiguration of the interchange.

The design of the new interchange will be similar to the new DDI at American Fork Main Street, except it will flow underneath the existing I-15 bridge structure at the location. No new bridges will be built for the new interchange; rather, the existing bridge structure will remain in place and the roadway will be reconfigured into a diverging diamond.

During the month of May motorists will see work on the freeway ramps and some work under the

bridge. There will be shoulder impacts, and one of the right lane turns to northbound I-15 will be eliminated during construction. There will also be weekend work that will restrict some turning movements during the month.

Here’s what else you should see and experience on Timpanogos Highway during the month of May:

- Grading operations all along the corridor (please be aware that the delivery of dirt and gravel for the road base will be included with these operations, so there will be a lot of big dump trucks on the roadway);
- Placement of new pavement from the east frontage road to Center Street in Lehi;
- Construction of new roadway walls at Center Street in Lehi and east of Highland Blvd.;
- The relocation of a sewer line near Highland Blvd. – please be prepared for traffic control measures in this area.

The Timpanogos Highway project is expanding S.R. 92 from I-15 to S.R. 74 in Highland, to five lanes. Between I-15 and Highland Boulevard, UDOT is augmenting the arterial with "Commuter Lanes," which will provide a direct connection to and from I-15 without stopping at intersections. The project is scheduled for completion in October 2011.
