## MAYOR'S CORNER

Progress on the North County Blvd. (4800 W) continues, this new road will be a much needed improvement and we sincerely appreciate your patience. Construction will continue in front of Lone Peak High School daily, Monday to Friday from 7:00 am -5:30 pm through November. To help avoid problems and construction zones, the County has asked that students and others use the east side of the road.

Construction on the former Highland City Hall has begun in order to bring it into compliance with ADA standards allowing the building to be used for future community activities.

Highland City Public Works Department has completed an area just west of our public works building for the purpose of parking, drop-off/pick-up of school children in the View Point Subdivision. This solved a very serious safety issue for school children as well as traffic conflicts with our public works heavy vehicles.

Progress continues to be made on the Murdock Connector (east/west). An interlocal agreement with Utah County for construction

and right-of-way acquisition should be in place over the next month. The plan calls for construction in 2011 to take place in conjunction with the construction of phase II of the North County Blvd. that will extend from the Murdock Canal to State Street in Am. Fork.

The Highland City website will be getting a new look in 2011. Staff is working with a new website vendor to upgrade our website with many new features, new design, and upgrade of functionality. This is a time consuming process but we are looking forward to the changes.

Congressman Matheson has informed me that a Salt Lake architectural firm has completed three designs for the Timpanogos Cave Visitors Center. This is the first step in the process of moving towards construction. The new facility will be located in Highland, along SR92 near the mouth of the canyon.

If you have any concerns or ideas that you believe will improve our City, I would like to meet with you. I am available at the City Offices on Tuesdays from 8:00 am-11:00 am. You can set up an appointment by contacting Jody at 801-772-4505.

## Recycling News You Can Use!

Did you know that much of what is thrown away can be recycled? Curbside recycling can be used for the following: newspapers, magazines, junk mail, glossy ads, phone books, #1-7 plastics (pop bottles, milk jugs, detergent jars, water bottles, etc.), tin cans, aluminum cans, corrugated cardboard, tissue boxes, cereal boxes, food boxes, metal clothing hangers, empty paper and toilet paper rolls. There is no need to sort or take off labels, just rinse out food particles and toss! (No glass or Styrofoam is accepted at this time.)

Signing up is as easy as calling the City office! The service for one Recycle toter is just \$4.10 each per month, which is less than the cost of a second garbage toter. ### Crosswalks - by Kip Botkin, Chief of Police

The police department has been asked to clarify some possible confusion involving the law as it relates to pedestrians in a crosswalk. The Utah Codes Annotated (Utah State Laws) addresses pedestrians and crosswalks in Part 10 of Title 41, Chapter 6a.

Within 41-6a-1002 there is a distinction of two types of "crosswalks". They are differentiated as a "crosswalk" and a "school crosswalk". A "school crosswalk" is one where flashing lights indicate that the crosswalk ahead is primarily used for or by school students and therefore is a "school crosswalk". **A driver's responsibility to pedestrians within the two types of crosswalks IS DIFFERENT.**

In a NON-school crosswalk, the law requires "... the operator of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way by slowing down or stopping if necessary:

- to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk when the pedestrian is on the half of the roadway upon which the vehicle is traveling; or
- when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the roadway as to be in danger.
- The operator of a vehicle approaching a *school crosswalk* shall come to a complete stop at the school crosswalk if: (emphasis added)
  - a school speed limit sign has the warning lights operating; and
  - the *crosswalk is occupied by a person.*" (emphasis added)

The difference being when a school crosswalk is functioning as a school crosswalk (indicated by flashing lights and normally a crossing guard present) drivers must yield to a pedestrian when that pedestrian is *anywhere* in the crosswalk (either side of the roadway). Also, remember the crossing guard is a pedestrian within the crosswalk anytime they are off the curb, on the pavement and within the marked crosswalk.

There are areas where a driver will turn onto a street between the flashing lights and the crosswalk. Some drivers enter the school crossing without passing the flashing lights. These drivers are still responsible to obey the traffic laws as they apply to pedestrians in the school crosswalk.

Hopefully, this information is helpful in understanding the law as it relates to pedestrian's rights-of way and driver's responsibilities to pedestrians within crosswalks.

### Lone Peak Fire District News

Recently the fire department has responded on several **bicycle related accidents**. Our paramedics and firefighters treated injuries which ranged from bumps and bruises to one child being life flighted to Primary Children's Medical Center in critical condition. We would like to remind our citizens to review safe bicycling practices such as riding on the right side of the road, wearing a helmet, and walking their bikes across crosswalks.

**October is fire prevention month.** With this we would like to invite you to schedule a tour of your local fire station. Each month we get several school groups, church groups, and individual families touring our fire stations. Come by and see what it's like to be a firefighter. ## Work Accelerating on S.R. 92 as Winter Weather Looms

### *Paving Activities Dominate the October Construction Schedule*

With winter weather looming on the horizon, work on the S.R. 92 construction project between Town Center Blvd. and I-15 is moving forward at an accelerated pace.

"There's a lot of work we want to get done before the snow flies, so we're working as hard and fast as possible," said Bryan Adams, UDOT program director for the S.R. 92 project.

Within the Highland City portion of the project, work during the month of October will focus on completing work on the south side of S.R. 92 now that traffic has been shifted to the newly paved north side. That will include the installation of new storm drains; the relocation of sewer lines; installation of curb, gutter and sidewalk; and the placement of new asphalt.

"With the placement of asphalt we are limited by temperatures and other weather conditions," Adams said. "We hope to have the entire roadway between 6400 West and Town Center Blvd. restored and open before the end of this construction season."

Within the Lehi portion of the S.R. 92 project, motorists will see a lot of concrete paving over the newly constructed roadway. At various times during the month motorists will see paving from around Triumph Blvd. and extending eastward almost to Highland Blvd. Work on the bridges at Triumph Blvd. and 1200 West will be completed. All of this work in Lehi is in preparation for moving traffic from the existing roadway to the new pavement sometime in December.

"We are aware that all of this work is creating some significant impacts on neighborhoods and motorists," Adams said. "We appreciate the patience that is being shown by all who are dealing with these impacts. We are doing everything we can to get in, get it done and get out of your way as quickly as possible so you can enjoy the new S.R. 92."
