Highland Community Enrichment Grant

Highland City periodically has been requested to disburse funds to various groups or persons seeking financial assistance with various projects in the community. In order to (1) properly budget such disbursements, (2) fairly allocate the disbursements among competing interests, and (3) identify a selection process and guidelines for the disbursements, Highland City has adopted a policy statement which includes the following: (1) Annual budget of \$1,000; (2) budget will be divided by four, and disbursed on a quarterly basis; (3) funds do not have to be expended in any given quarter or year, and may be carried over from quarter to quarter, or from year to year, depending upon the Council's determination after review of the applications; (4) Selection guidelines: (a) Preference should be given to expenditures which result in improvements which are more permanent, rather than less permanent; (b) Preference should be given to expenditures which benefit Highland citizens, rather than citizens of other communities; (c) Preference should be given to expenditures which benefit Highland citizens, rather than Highland businesses; (d) Preference should be given to expenditures which benefit more Highland citizens, rather than fewer Highland citizens. (5) Applications: Applicants should prepare a written application briefly stating the purpose for which the funds will be used. (7) Selection Procedure. (a) City will advertise the call for applications through a reasonable means; (b) If City Council has questions concerning an application, it may request an oral presentation; (c) The City Council may request City Staff to screen applications and make recommendations; (d) After receipt and review the City Council will allocate available funds, or portions thereof, as the City Council may determine to the applicants; (e) the City Council, in its discretion, may determine not to disburse any funds.
