Mayor's Report: City Activities last 6 months

In January I outlined for the City Council my objectives for the City. Simply stated they are: 1) Provide essential services. 2) Build reserves of cash to fund essential projects. 3) Evaluate and update ordinances. 4) Cultivate trust, respect, and civility. 5) Progress toward solutions for open space areas. 6) Foster economic development in the town center.

We have been busy in the city over these last 6 months accomplishing these and other council objectives. Our cash position of the city has increased \$291k from original projections. This was realized through decreases in staff positions not backfilled as well as bringing our parks maintenance contract in-house from an outside contractor. We signed the agreement with Utah County for the Murdock Canal Trail. This trail will follow the Murdock Canal from Provo Canyon in Orem to the I-15 freeway and will be constructed over the next 3 years following the Piping of the Murdock Canal. We have completed all but two parcels of property for right-of-way for the Murdock Connector Road that will connect 4800W and SR74. The County will be constructing this road and we hope to complete it in the fall of 2011. Along with this road we have exchanged some small pieces of property with the County to rebuild 4800W from SR92 to the Murdock Canal. This new 5 lane road will be a great asset to Highland residents and will be completed by November 2010 changing the name from 4800 West to North County Blvd.

Additional projects we have completed are the renewal of the garbage contract for the city. We were able to hold pricing level for this year with minor increases over the next 4 years. Also, we have reviewed ordinances in the City for updating. We have put a moratorium on the Town Center Ordinance to review and revise it. The Planning Commission has done an excellent job in their

review for the ordinance to come before the Council in July. I am sure you have noticed the new development in the Town Center called Toscana at Highland. These townhomes are in the Parade of Homes and have been successful in their initial sales. There will be 162 total units at completion. Another ordinance Council is now reviewing is the new Group Home ordinance with many new changes and improvements.

We have saved \$696,000 in this current year's budget or 9.96% from reduced staffing and maintenance contracts. The difficulties going forward into next year are added expenses of \$544,000 from bond debt payments and increases in our Public Safety District. However, even with these increases we were able to generate enough savings to develop a budget \$153,000 less than last year. The Council voted to reduce \$86,000 from property tax revenues to a total revenue of \$239,000 less than last year. We are now reviewing our capital and utility funds and plans to share with residents for those funds over the next few months. One large increase is our sewer fund where we received a 27% increase from Timpanogos Service District for capital improvements. We have no choice but to raise these fees.

We created an open space committee to address problems in our open space areas. We appreciate citizens willingness to serve and expect we will see solutions as they work through issues. Last but not least, we have hired a new City Administrator. His name is John Park. John will bring much experience to the City and we are happy to welcome him to Highland.

We will keep you informed over the next 6 months of events and activities we are doing. We appreciate the active involvement of the community and the suggestions we have received.

Open Space Committee Created

Mayor Lynn Ritchie recently created a committee comprised of open space and non-open space residents to help define issues and develop solutions related to the 18 open space subdivisions in Highland City and to present recommendations to the City Council. The committee is chaired by Ed Dennis, a resident of the Wembleton open space subdivision. Ed Barfuss (non-open space resident), Doug Cunningham (Beacon Hills), Ginger Ford (View Pointe), Dave Hall (Canterbury Park Circle), Carol Kounanis (Highland Hills), Greg Parkinson (non-open space resident), Kristi Vick (Chamberry Fields) and Doug Ybarra (Highland Hills) also serve on the committee. City Council member Scott Smith and City Public Works Director, Matt Shipp, have been asked to serve as the City liaisons to the committee. The committee meets twice per month at the Highland City Office building and welcomes input from all Highland City residents regarding current concerns and ideas for the future of open space areas as well as issues such as parks, trails, fences, fees, etc. More information can be found under the Community Involvement tab at www.highlandcity.org.

Welcome New City Administrator John Park

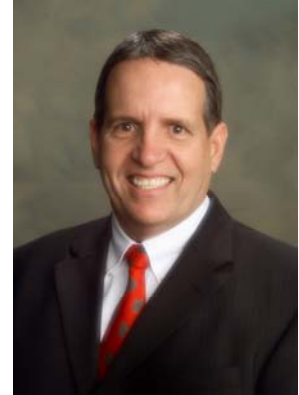

Highland SR-92 Widening Nears Halfway Point

Curb & Gutter Placement, Paving Will Lead Up To Early August Traffic Switch

Work on the Highland portion of UDOT's SR-92 project is nearing the half-way point, with July activities aimed at finishing work on the north side of the roadway between 6400 West and Town Center Blvd. in preparation for a traffic switch in early August.

"We're making good progress throughout the project, and we're hoping for a nice run of good, clear weather that will allow us to move even faster," said Bryan Adams, program director for UDOT's Access Utah County project.

Adams praised Highland residents for the excellent way they have responded to the construction configuration. "With the narrower (11-foot) lanes and the elimination of the center turning lane, motorists have to be alert and careful as they drive through the area," Adams said. "While we've had a few incidents, for the most part drivers have handled the situation well. We hope that will continue through the end of the summer, when we expect to have this portion of the SR-92 project completed."

During the month of July crews will be placing curb and gutter on the north side of the roadway in preparation for paving operations at the end of the month.

When the north side is paved and ready for operation, traffic will be switched to the new pavement and work will commence on the south side of the road.

Elsewhere on the SR-92 reconstruction project in July, work continues on preparing for the new commuter lanes, which will eventually carry motorists directly to and from I-15 without having to stop at the various intersections along SR-92. Storm drains will be put in place and final grading will be done prior to the start of paving. Work will also continue on bridges being built at 1200 West and

Triumph Blvd.

"As you drive by you'll see that things are starting to take shape," Bryans said. "But don't look too closely – please continue to concentrate on the roadway while you're driving. Construction zones require your full attention, especially when flaggers and other workers are present."

The SR-92 reconstruction project is part of Access Utah County, a UDOT program designed to improve mobility in northern Utah County. It is scheduled for completion in Fall 2011.

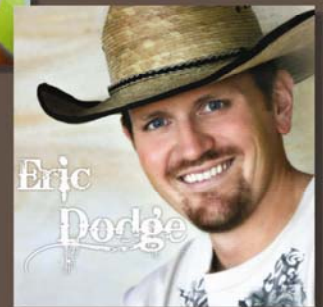
