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## 2008 ELECTION INFORMATION

ELECTION DAY - NOVEMBER 4, 2008 • EARLY VOTING - OCTOBER 21 - 31, 2008

The election this year is a presidential/gubernatorial election and will be handled by the Utah County Elections office. All forms for voter registration and absentee voting must be sent to Utah County at 100 East Center, Provo, Utah.

**VOTER REGISTRATION:** Since the last election, if you have changed your name or moved, even within the City, you must re-register to vote. All mail-in voter registration forms must be postmarked on or before October 6, 2008. This form is available at the City office, online at [utahcountyonline.org](http://utahcountyonline.org), or you may do a walk-in registration until October 20 at the Utah County Clerk/Elections office (100 East Center Street, Room 3100, Provo). There is no more Satellite Registration so please use the above options if you need to register or re-register to vote.

**EARLY AND ABSENTEE VOTING:** If you will be unavailable to vote on Election Day, you may vote early or by absentee ballot. Early voting runs October 21 until October 31, weekends excluded, at five different locations in Utah County. For locations and hours visit the City's website at [www.highlandcity.org](http://www.highlandcity.org) or contact the County Elections Office at 851-8127. Apply for absentee voting at the Utah County Elections office.

**ELECTION DAY VOTING:** Not sure where to vote? Highland Precincts #1 (HI01) and #3 (HI03) vote at Freedom Elementary School (10326 North 6800 West). Highland Precincts #2 (HI02) and #5 (HI05) vote at Lone Peak High School (10189 North 4800 West). Highland Precincts #6 (HI06) and #7 (HI07) vote at Mountain Ridge Jr. High (5525 West 10400 North). Highland Precinct #4 (HI04) and Draper Precinct #1 (DR01) vote at Ridgeline Elementary (6250 West 11800 North). Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 4, 2008.

## REGULATIONS ON DOOR TO DOOR SOLICITATION

Many residents are aware of the incident that took place in American Fork in September where a solicitor allegedly assaulted an American Fork woman in her home. The police department urges residents to exercise caution with solicitors.

Several months ago, the Highland City Council passed an ordinance regulating solicitors which protects the rights of the residents and solicitor. Under the provisions of ordinance, a company is required to be licensed with the State and obtain a solicitors license from Highland City to work in the city. Solicitors are also required to provide a recent criminal background

check. Each solicitor has an ID card to wear that is issued by the City. If a solicitor comes to your door they should display the identification card. If the card is not presented, the police recommend you decline to do business and call the police department at 756-9800.

In the American Fork incident, the solicitor was not licensed. Ensuring that you see the City-issued solicitor identification before engaging in conversation will help with safety issues. To prohibit door-to-door sales at your residence, please post a "No Soliciting" sign at the door. ### Fall Clean-Up

**Extra large dumpsters will be placed throughout Highland City starting Friday, October 10. They will be removed starting Monday, October 13. Dumpsters will be at the following locations:**

- Dry Creek Bench Park
- Heritage Park
- Mitchell Hollow Park
- Windsor Meadows Park

Things that can't be placed in dumpsters include: appliances, chemicals, paint, tires, concrete, rocks and dirt. All items must be placed in the dumpster, not on the ground and not in the smaller dumpsters (Mitchell Hollow Park and Heritage Park have smaller dumpsters year-round). Once the extra large dumpsters are removed please do not use the small dumpsters located in Heritage Park or Mitchell Hollow Park as these dumpsters are for park trash only. This service is provided to Highland City Residents in the spring and fall each year.

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## RECYCLING NEWS YOU CAN USE!

Did you know that much of what is thrown away can be recycled? Curbside recycling can be used for the following: newspapers, magazines, junk mail, glossy ads, phone books, #1 and #2 plastics (pop bottles, milk jugs, detergent jars, water bottles, etc.), tin cans, aluminum cans, corrugated cardboard, tissue, cereal, food boxes, metal clothing hangers, empty paper and toilet paper rolls

No need to sort or take off labels. Just rinse out food particles and toss! (No glass or Styrofoam is accepted at this time.) Signing up is as easy as calling the City office! The service for one toter is just \$4.10 per month, which is less than the cost of a second garbage toter. And second recycling toter are also available, so call today! (Recycling toters are emptied every other week on the regular garbage pick-up day.)

**Prevent Identity Theft!** Shred anything with your name or confidential information. Rather than dumping loose shredded material into the blue toter, put it in a clear large garbage bag. It will be easily identified at the transfer center and put with the paper bin for paper recycling.

Recently, Councilmember Claudia Stillman went on a tour of the Waste Management recycling facility in West Jordan. Read the following tips about recycling issues.

### What to Do:

1. Recycle everything you can to help protect the environment.

### What Not to Do:

1. Don't put plastic bags you get with purchases at the grocery store in the blue recycling toter. These bags clog up the machinery at the recycling facility, causing expense and loss of time. Many stores are set up to recycle the bags. Save them up and return them to the store.
2. Don't bother to rinse out liquids such as juices, soda, etc. from plastic bottles. And don't bother to replace the lids. Just toss them in the blue toter.
3. Don't place any items in the toter that contain food particles. This would contaminate the entire lot. So rinsing food from cans and containers IS necessary.
4. Don't separate different types of materials. The Waste Management facility is designed to do that as part of the contract. Just put all that you can into the blue toter and help save our landfills and protect our environment.
