MAYOR'S CORNER

Several topics have come to the City recently that I felt needed to be communicated to all residents.

First, the requirements for Architectural Review in some developments. Recently, resident built homes that did not comply with the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) requirements. In other subdivisions, residents have come to the City stating that new homes have not complied with the Homeowners Association (HOA) requirements and the Conditions, Covenants, and Restrictions (CC&R). When these non-compliant issues come to the City, Highland City, or any City in Utah, does not have the authority to enforce any of these requirements. These issues are settled within the HOA. We assist developers to have them put these requirements on the plat that is recorded with the County, but we do not have the means to keep tract of the requirements at the City. The developer or seller is responsible to make sure the homeowner is aware of any covenants or restrictions. The city does inform developers of existing ARC's and requires them to sign that they have contacted the committee. Homeowners should ask and get copies of all documents associated with their subdivision. The residents of that subdivision then organize and enforce the requirements.

Second, the upcoming Pressurized Irrigation Audit. We have been in the process of conducting an audit of all properties throughout Highland. The audit will include two parts — The first will only apply to those residents who were required to purchase irrigation water through their utility bill. Currently, the regular cost of Pressure Irrigation and this loan are combined on the utility bill. In the January bill, the water purchase line item will

only reflect the cost you are paying to purchase water shares. The cost of the water usage, as based on the size of your lot will now be added to the line item "PI water". The combination of the two line items will not change, but we believe this better reflects the costs. The second part of the audit includes a review of charges for Pressurized Irrigation based on the size of your lot to ensure the charge matches the acreage. This is ongoing as we want to make sure we are accurate and that residents are not paying too much or too little for the acreage owned. If the City finds a major discrepancy the staff will notify you by mail.

A final item is to express a sincere thank-you to Larry Mendenhall and Kathryn Schramm. These two individuals have served on the City Council and have contributed tremendously to our City's success. Larry has served on the Planning Commission prior to serving on the City Council. He has served additionally on the Public Safety District Board. He has given tremendous service to Highland City to make it a great City. Kathryn has served on the City Council and has given long hours and much service to the City. Additionally she has served on the North Point Special Service District. We wish them both much success in the future and thank them for sharing their time and talents with the City.

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CEMETERY DECORATION CLEAN-UP

The cemetery is cleaned up weekly during the mowing season to remove perishable items and items that are in the grass area. In addition to the weekly cleanup, four times a year a mass cleanup is performed. The next mass cleanup for the Cemetery will be on Monday, December 5th. At this time perishable items will be discarded and all trinkets, ornaments, lamps, shepherd-crooks, etc. will be removed from the cemetery and taken to the Public Works Shop (4066 West 11000 North). These items will be held for two (2) weeks so that the owner may claim the items. Items not claimed after two (2) weeks will be discarded.

Lone Peak Fire District News

This Holiday Season there are a few fire safety items that we would like to address. Remember to keep all open flames secured within a fire resistant area. Open flames such as candles, especially in bedrooms, are a high cause of house fires. When using heaters inside a home, tent, etc. make sure that they are designed for closed spaces. Heaters that burn fuel are usually not designed to be used inside and produce Carbon Monoxide, a deadly gas. Make sure that your smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors are working with fresh batteries installed. Lastly if you live near a fire hydrant make sure that the snow is removed with at least a 3' clear radius around it. During a fire, time is of the essence. Removing the snow makes it faster to locate and attach fire hoses to take care of your emergency.

- •Did you know that in 95% of emergencies by standers or victims themselves are the first to perform emergency assistance or rescues? There is still time to purchase FIRST AID KITS from Lone Peak EMS. These make great holiday gifts. - •Fire departments along the Wasatch Front are teaming up to collect blankets and winter coats for Utah charities that assist the poor. The annual "Operation Cover-Up" runs through Dec. 31. The public can help by donating new or gently used winter wear at any local fire station. Used donations should be clean. Donations will benefit The Road Home shelters, Christmas Box House, Shiner's Hospital, Division of Aging Services, Newborn Intensive Care Unit, and St. Vincent de Paul.

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Timpanogos Highway Update

A lot has changed during November along UDOT's Timpanogos Highway project. The easternmost section in Highland City between 6400 West and the Alpine Highway (S.R. 74) is now open to traffic and all of the landscaping is finished. Highland Blvd. was reopened and the temporary detour was removed. This allowed crews to rebuild the main entrance to Center Pointe shopping which was also reopened in November. Also, the diverging diamond interchange (DDI) at I-15 is fully open to traffic with only minimal finish work to be completed.

During December, Highland residents can expect to see additional lanes open throughout the project and the reopening of 6400 West. By the end of the year UDOT plans to have all five lanes fully open to traffic. This will significantly improve traffic flow throughout the corridor during the winter months. The commuter lanes are anticipated to open in early 2012. Residents are encouraged to stay actively engaged in the progress of the final stages of the project by signing up for weekly email updates and frequently visiting www.udot.utah.gov/sr92, emailing access@utah.gov, or calling 877-222-3757 with questions.

The Timpanogos Highway project will bring a much-needed improvement over the previous roadway including more capacity, a smoother ride, better access to surrounding businesses and increased mobility options. With the addition of the DDI, not originally a part of the project, the interchange can now accommodate current and future traffic demands at I-15. Efficiency and commute times will also be improved with the commuter lanes, providing a no-stopping option for those traveling directly to and from I-15 from the eastern communities.
