MAYOR'S CORNER

We continue to focus on issues most important to Highland City. We administered the oath of office to our new Council members Jessie Schoenfeld, Brian Braithwaite, and Tim Irwin in a ceremony separate from our regular City Council Meeting. It was a great occasion to have family members present and be a part of the oath process. We look forward to working with the new Council members in accomplishing good things as a City Council.

Our finances are becoming stronger as I mentioned in my State of the City address. As a City, we basically have not spent money on any major new projects. We have concentrated on maintaining and repairing what we have instead of purchasing new. We expect this trend to continue through the economic downturn. Sales tax as a way to offset tax increases has increased very modestly (\$2010YTD) through December. We welcome the new Artic Circle that opened this year along the Alpine Highway. The Economic Development Committee is also working to encourage new business to come to Highland. These efforts will increase goods and services to residents and increase our tax base.

On another note, our transportation committee will be reporting in the month of February to the Council their findings for road improvement needs in the City. This will serve as a blueprint to prioritize our local road construction and repair plans. As funds allow, we will be concentrating on City roads over the next few years. By the way, three cheers that orange barrels are removed from North County

Blvd. (old 4800W). Also, SR92 to the freeway is beginning to show signs of completion for the 5 lanes and the Expressway. This should be complete by late spring or early summer this year.

An additional note, the National Parks Service and the Forest Service just completed a transportation feasibility study of alternatives to transport Timpanogos Cave visitors from a new Highland Visitor's Center to the Cave. The study looked at mandatory shuttle service with a small parking area at the Cave site to expanded parking at the Cave. Shuttle service from the new visitor's center would be a welcome addition to Highland. Visitors would spend time in Highland shopping and eating before and after Cave visits. It would enhance our image and slogan as "Gateway to American Fork Canyon". At this point funding has been appropriated and design is complete for the new Center. Funding for construction is several years away but progress is moving forward with the planning stage.

I continue to enjoy visiting with you on various issues in the City. If you have any question please let me or a Council member know.
