



MAYOR'S CORNER "ROUGH ROADS AHEAD"



Driving on Highland roads is usually smooth. The quality of the road beneath our tires isn't something that we normally pay attention to ... unless the road

is bad and our vehicle takes a beating! A recent study by the *American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials* showed that bad roads cost each motorist an average of \$335 per year, nationally. In Highland City, we're fortunate because most of our roads are in relatively good shape and we need to keep them in that condition. Since Highland City has approximately 180 lane miles of roads, there are some roads that need immediate work. But even the roads that are in reasonably good shape need routine maintenance to stay that way. Delaying road maintenance is sort of like ignoring a cavity in your tooth. You can take care of the problem immediately for a fairly low cost, or you can ignore the problem and pay more to fix the problem later. If the cavity isn't filled soon, the cost of a root canal (and the time, pain and effort involved) will be exponentially greater. Another transportation study shows that for every dollar that it costs to keep a road in good condition, you'd have to spend \$4-\$6 to reconstruct it.

A recent study by an independent group of transportation engineers in Highland City recommended that Highland City allocate

\$600,000 per year for road maintenance and \$20M for future road rebuilds. Four to six years ago we built some new roads; Knight Ave, 5600W, and 11800N with maintenance dollars. Because of these new roads and in order not to overextend our road spending, we have pulled back on road maintenance for the last several years. Now we need to change the focus from the new road construction and pay attention to the necessary road maintenance and rebuilds. The City Council has passed a road fee that begins the process to follow the recommendation made by the independent engineering study. The road fee is significantly less than the \$335 average that bad roads will cost each motorist per year. It will allow us to perform routine maintenance now, before the roads require costly rebuilding in the future. It will also allow us to set funds aside for future rebuilding as it becomes necessary.

We urge you to help us keep Highland beautiful and safe. The road fee will allow us to keep our roads safe, useful and cost-efficient. Please support the budget request of \$15.42/month per household to maintain roads now and rebuild in the future.

REDUCE WATER USAGE IN SEPTEMBER

Use less water during September. The Utah Department of Environmental Quality is asking for Utahns to scale back on how frequently lawns are being watered. Lower temperatures in September reduce the need for watering to approximately **once per week**.

Adjust your individual sprinkler system and make it a habit to follow recommended watering requirements based on temperature, precipitation, type of soil, etc. For more information, visit the Utah Division of Water Resources Web site at: www.conservewater.utah.gov/

Water Conservation Notice

On June 18, 2013, the Mayor and City Council passed a Water Conservation Proclamation in response to the low runoff coming out of American Fork Canyon and 70% water reduction by one of our main water sources (Deer Creek Storage Water). What does this mean to you?

- Mandatory limits on Watering Days according to the following schedule:
 - ⇒ Even Numbered Street Address: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday
 - ⇒ Odd Numbered Street Address: Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday
 - ⇒ No Sunday Watering
- Limit of Hours: Not yet mandatory, but recommended watering between the hours of 10:00 pm—6:00 am.
- Limits of Watering Duration: Not yet mandatory, but recommended not longer than 30 minutes per station.
- Manage Runoff: Adjust sprinklers to water lawns, flowers, and gardens. Avoid excessive flow and runoff onto sidewalks and streets.
- There are penalties in place for non-compliance (see Proclamation).
- Applies to all residents in Highland.

PI System to shut down October 15

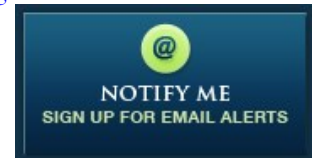
The pressurized irrigation system will be shut off on or around October 15. Please plan your watering schedules accordingly. When the system is shut down, please be sure to turn off your sprinkler system, open any manual drains, and also be sure to close the main valve in your PI box. This will prevent unintended flooding in the Spring, and may help avoid frozen and broken pipes this winter.

Every season, it seems that a handful of residents forget these very important steps and suffer unnecessary flooding in the Spring. Please don't be the one affected next year; take a moment now to completely turn off your sprinkler system. In order to close your main valve, open the PI Box that is located somewhere in the yard; typically near the sidewalk or street. When you open the lid, be sure to keep an eye out for spiders that like to hide in these kinds of spaces. To close the valve, turn the handle so that it is perpendicular to the pipe, as shown in the picture. Then replace the lid, making sure that it is securely in place.

Cemetery Decoration Clean-Up

The cemetery is cleaned up weekly during the mowing season to remove perishable items and items that are in the grass area. In addition to the weekly cleanup, four times a year a mass cleanup is performed. The next mass cleanup for the Cemetery will be on **Monday, October 7th**. At this time perishable items will be discarded and all trinkets, ornaments, lamps, shepherd-crooks, etc. will be removed from the cemetery and taken to the Public Works Shop (4066 West 11000 North). These items will be held for two (2) weeks so that the owner may claim the items. Items not claimed after two (2) weeks will be discarded. We have created a Cemetery calendar on our website, www.highlandcity.org, which you can subscribe to receive notifications reminding you about the four major cleanup dates. Sewer Maintenance and Prevention Tips

In order to properly maintain high-quality sanitation standards, and to prevent back-ups and other problems, the Sewer Department asks for your help:

- Do not flush grease or oils into the sewer system. These products build up inside the collection pipe and may cause the sewer main to plug.
- Please try to avoid flushing feminine hygiene products and baby wipes into the sewer. Flushing of these products is the leading cause of sewer backups.
- Do not flush any type of medication into the sewer. You may properly dispose of medication at the Lone Peak Police Department free of charge. Call (801) 756-9800 for more information.
- If we are working in your area and you smell an unpleasant odor in your house, it may be that your drains have been siphoned dry. To remove of the odor, just run water down the drain.
